## THE WIGGINTON NAME

Originally there were no family names. Men were known by a single given name. Surnames began to be used about the year 1000 and by the close of the twelfth century were in general use. Family names originating at that time were derived from various sources; some from occupations, as Smith, Priest, Farmer; some by suffixing "son" to the father's name as Will-son, Davids-son, Roberts-son; some from physical characteristics as Long, Black, Armstrong.

Many were derived from places of habitation, and among these was the name of Wiggintons, who according to Bardsley (English and Welsh Surnames, Bardsley, page 812 British Family Names, Barber, page 226) came from Wigand-town, an important town in South Lancashire, England and settled at a very early date in what later came to be called Wigginton Parish in the counties of Oxford, York, Hertford and Stafford.

The first mention of the name is found on the Hundred Rolls, in which occurs the name of "Roger de Wygynton" as living in the year 1273 in Oxford County. It is worthy of note that Roger was the most frequent name among the early Wiggintons in America.

The Wigginton name is among the rarest of English names. It occurs in the New York City Business Directory but once and in the San Francisco Directory but twice. The Chicago Directory gives only two Wigginton families as living in that city, the Saint Louis Directory gives one and the Post Office Directory of London, England gives none. (City Directories, Edition of 1912.) The family was never a large one and has evidently failed to keep pace with the growth of population in either England or the United States.

The writing which Mr. Cannon desires explained follows in full:

Sable 3 mascles argent, or 3 lozenges pierced  
as to show field in center.

The above is as I understand it. J.W.W.

This purports to be what is known as a "blazon"; i.e., a description in technical heraldic language from which a coat-of-arms may be drawn. The technical terms used here are

Sable - black

Masle - a lozenge, pierced to show the field.

Argent - silver

Field - the general background of the shield, upon which the armorial charges are placed.

In non-technical language, therefore, this blazon would read:

A black shield upon which are 3 silver lozenges pierced to show the shield.

But this is incorrect, for the shield in the illustration is white (silver) and the lozenges are black. The blazon should read as follows in order to agree with the illustration:

Argent, 3 mascles sable.

(On a silver shield 3 black pierced lozenges)

That this is correct is attested by both Burke's "General armory" (London, 1884) and Papworth's "Alphabetical dictionary of coats of arms" (London, 1874) who ascribe arms with the above blazon to the family of Wigginton (Wigginton).

William Wigginton evidently emigrated to America from England in the last half of the 17th Century and settled in Stafford County, Virginia, which at that time comprised the present counties of Stafford, Prince William, Fairfax and Loudoun. He received a grant of 85 acres of land in Stafford County, November 21, 1694, which is recorded in the "Northern Newek Records" of grants in the Colony of Virginia preserved at Richmond. As no mention of any other family of the name has been found in the Colonial records, and as the grants to him and Henry (III-3) are the only grants to Wiggintons under the Colonial Government, and a careful search of the county records, the poll tax lists of 1741 and 1744 and the Census returns of 1782 and 1790 fail to disclose others of the name, they may have been father, son and grandson. However, nothing is known of the personnel of his family and such conclusion is purely surmise.

Two widely separated members of the Wigginton Family recall the tradition that William (I-1) was the emigrant and came to America in 1655 (1). But one of them later wrote saying he had employed a professional genealogist to investigate the matter who reported that "the William who came to America in 1655 was not our William" (2). No evidence has been submitted to indicate definitely that such a William Wigginton came to America in 1655.

This is the first Roger in the Wigginton records. Following him a Roger appears in every succeeding generation. The only information available on him is found in his will probated in Westmoreland County, Virginia, July 30, 1718, as follows:

WILL OF ROGER WIGGINTON  
(Records of Westmoreland County, Virginia, D.B.6, page 349)

In the name of God, Amen. I, Roger Wigginton, of Copel Parish, in the County of Westmorland., being sick & weak of body but of perfect sense & memory, thanks be to God for the same, do make this my last will & testament in manner and form following, revoking all other wills before by me made, either in word or in writing. Imprs. I give & bequeath to my dear son Wm. Wigginton my negro man named Dick to him & his heirs forever. Item. I give & bequeath to my dear son Roger Wigginton my negro woman named Winney to him & his heirs forever. I give & bequeath to my dear daughter Elizabeth Wigginton my negro woman named Betty to her & her heirs forever. Item. I give to my daughter Ann Wigginton a negro girl named Nanny to her and her heirs forever & in case the said negro girl should bear children then I give & bequeath the first negro child the said negro girl shall bear to my dear son Henry Wigginton & his heirs forever. Item. I give & bequeath to all my dear children above mentioned & to each of them a feather bed & what furniture belongs to them. Item. I give & bequeath my watch to my dear son William. Item. I give my silver tumbler and my shoe buckles to my said son Roger. Item. I give to each of my sons a gun & to my oldest sons I give each of them a pair of pistols. Item. I order will & bequeath the remainder of my estate to be equally divided between all my children.

Item, I constitute, ordain & appoint my dear brother William Wigginton & my good friend Willoughby Allerton Esq. in trust of this my last will & testament that is to say till my two eldest sons Wm. & Roger shall arrive to the age of eighteen at which age it is my will that they be admitted executors of this my last will and testament and in witness that this is my last will & testament.

I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 3rd day of March Anno. Dom. 1717/8.

Oldest son of Roger Wigginton (II-2) and nominated as co-executor of his will. Under 18 years of age at the time of the execution of the will in 1717. No further information.

The will of Roger Wigginton is recorded among the records of Fairfax County at Fairfax, Virginia and is indexed in the same book with the will of George Washington. He was deeded a tract of land in Truro Parish in Fairfax County, Merch 2, 1747. His estate inventoried nearly eight thousand pounds (about \$40,000) exclusive of his land. His will is as follows:

WILL OF ROGER WIGGINTON

(Records of Fairfax County, Virginia, book L, Page 2.)

I, Roger Wigginton, in the Name of God Amen, do give my soul to almighty God & my body to the Dust from whence it came, being very sick and week, though in perfect sence and memory.

Item. I do give to my son, Spencer Wigginton, three negros, Jack, Frank & little Nan, and all my wairing close, and its my will and desire that they may not be appraised to him, and his heirs forever.

Item. I do give to my Daughter, Ann Wigginton, two negros, Jane and Sandy, they and their increase forever.

Item. I do give to my son, Spencer Wigginton the track of land lying in the County of Fairfax, to him forever.

Item. Though to my loving wife, Sarah Wigginton, I leave my whole estate during her life & then after her decease the remainder part of my estate to be divided among all my children. I leave my wife, Sarah Wigginton and my son, Spencer Wigginton Executors under the care of Richard Colemand.

ROGER WIGGINTON (Seal)

I Acknowledge this to be my last Will and Testament & rescinding all others, September 16, 1752.

Henry Wigginton received two grants of land from the Crown, the first of 300 acres in what was then Stafford, County, Virginia, October 15, 1724, and the second, of 124 acres in the same county in 1730.

No information relative to his immediate family, either documentary or traditional is to be found. Roger and Henry may have been sons, grandsons or nephews. The evidence at hand is too meager to determine relationship, if any.

Spencer Wigginton was a lieutenant in Captain Sampson Trammell's company of the Loudoun County Militia in 1781 and is referred to in Order Book G of the Loudoun County Court (Crozier's Virginia County records, Vol. 9, page 54). His will is on file in Fairfax, Virginia.

Hon. James R. Catton, an attorney of Alexandria, Virginia, whose mother was a Wigginton, says that two of Spencer Wigginton's descendants, Misses Susan and Lucy Wigginton, owned and lived on a part of the site of the battle of Manassas. During the battle Miss Susan was wounded by a ball from the effects of which she subsequently died. Mrs. Henry, a neighbor, whose home was directly between the lines, was too ill to be moved and was instantly killed by the explosion of a shell which fell into her room through the chimney. That night Miss Lucy traversed the entire length of the battle field to prepare her for burial. The sisters reared a niece and nephew, Annie and William H. Wigginton, the children of a deceased brother. William was reported by negro servants to be supplying information to the Confederates and was tried by Court Martial and sentenced to be shot, but President Lincoln commuted the sentence to life imprisonment without further investigation when he learned that the boy was but sixteen years old, and he was incarcerated in a Federal prison in New York. In 1865, shortly before his assassination, the President granted a full pardon. In 1924 William was living in the State of Arkansas.

The will of James Wigginton, recorded in Leesburg, Loudoun County, Virginia, names Benjamin as his oldest son and mentions other "sons and daughters". No further record of his children is found, and no further information concerning James is to be had. Strangely enough neither his name nor the name of any other Wigginton appears on the poll lists for the election of Representatives in the House of Burgesses for Prince William County, including Fairfax, Loudoun and Fauquier counties in 1741 or for Fairfax County, including Loudoun County in 1744. The difficulty of tracing the relationship of the family is further increased by the fact that all birth, death and marriage records of Fairfax County and Loudoun County were destroyed by Federal troops during the Civil War.

As indicated by his will, his wife was a daughter of Seth and Sibacah Botts, and a sister of Aaron Botts (born July 30, 1746, Overton Parish Register, Stafford County, Virginia, 1720-1760, by Wm. F. boogher). As recorded in the same Register, her sister, Elizabeth Botts was born October 3, 1741; her brother William botts was born April 16, 1744; her brother Joseph, June 23, 1748, her brother Joshua, July 24, 1751 and her sister Jennie Botts was born January 8, 1757. Her sister Elizabeth died April 17, 1751;.

The will of James Wigginton is on record in Loudoun County, Virginia, as follows:

WILL OF JAMES WIGGINTON

(Records of Loudoun County, Virginia, Book A page 148)

In the Name of God Amen. I, James Wigginton, of Loudoun County and the Colony of Virginia, being at this time in my full senses but in a very weak and low condition and desiring to meet the certainty of Death, I first recommend my soul to God who gave it and my body to be Decently interred at the Descretion of my Executors hereafter to be named.

Item. I desire all my Just Debts and Funeral Expenses to be first paid.

Item. I desire that a negro slave named Moses in the possession of my Mother, Sarah Wigginton, to remain in her Custody, and the Benefit of his Labour to be for my said Mother's use as long as she live, and after her Decease to be a part of my Estate as if the above desire had never been made.

Item. I give the use of all my Estate, Real and personal, to my beloved wife Sarah Wigginton so long as she Continue a Widow, and in case my said Wife should chose to marry, or if it should please God to affect her with Death, my desire and Will is that my Mother, Sarah Wigginton, should take my whole Estate, Real and personal in her hands, and in case of her Death that my Father-in-law, Seth Botts take it into his hands, and in case of his death that my Mother-in-law, Sibecah Botts, take it into her hands, and in case of her death my Brother-in-law, Aaron Botts, and in case of his Death, my brother John Wigginton, and with it also the care and Education of all my children to go with my Estate and with the above persons as they are named by this my last Will and Testament, in case of Death or Marriage of the first mentioned and so in case of Death in either of the others, which ever other, so as there shall be but one Executrix or Executor at the same time of this my Last Will and Testament or Constituted Executrix or Executor as the case may be.

Item. It is my Will and Desire that my sons be to Act and to for themselves at the age of Eighteen years and my daughters at the age of sixteen years, and as they arrive at the aforesaid age that they may receive, each one, an equal part of my Estate, excepting my land which I give to my Eldest Son, Benjamin. But in case my wife be Living and she still remain a Widow she in that case is to give each one of my children their part of my Estate at her Descretion.

My desire is that my Executrix or Executor Buy two slaves with the Money now in hand and what Money is due to me as soon as it Conveniently can be done and the said slaves to be able to Labour.

I, the said James Wigginton, do renounce and Deny all other Wills, Testaments, Gifts and Grants heretofore made and do make this may last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have

hereunto set my hand and Seal this Seventh day of August, Anno Domini, 1766.

At a Court continued and held for Loudoun County, August the Twelvth, 1766, This Will is proved by the oathes of Fneas Campbell, Gentleman, and Joseph Clage, witness thereto, and is ordered to be Recorded And on the Motion of Sarah Wigginton, the Executrix therein named, who makes oath according to Law, Certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate thereof in due form, giving securities. Whereupon she together with Benjamin Wigginton and John Wigginton, her securities, entered into an oath and Bond in the Penalty of one Thousand pounds with Conditions as the law directs.

Mentioned in the will of James (IV-10) as being his brother. Not too improbable that he was the John Wigginton (1760-1843) who married Margaret M. George, September 6, 1787 and who served under Light Horse Harry Lee in the Revolution and was pensioned by the United States in 1833 (Crozier's Virginia County Records, Vol. 7, page 50; Eckenrode's Virginia Revolutionary Soldiers, page 470).

Roger Wigginton is the first of the family of whom we have positive and authentic records. Family Bibles, old letters and his own will establish and authenticate the meagre data given and from him to the present day beyond question.

The first information available shows him to be living in Bourbon County, Kentucky. He moved from Bourbon County to Trimble County and was living in Trimble County in 1800. On his death he was buried on his Trimble County farm and his wife who went to live with her youngest son Greenberry in Oldham County, Kentucky was brought back for burial beside her husband on her death in 1869.

The social distinctions extant in England were transplanted to Colonial America where they were carefully maintained until the close of the Revolution. These distinctions were preserved in most of the deeds, wills and other legal documents of the times, as for instance: John Doe, "Gentleman" conveyed to Richard Roe, "Yeoman". Consequently the phrase: "Roger Wigginton, Gentleman" used by the notary in inditing his will indicates that his family belonged to the Virginia gentry, which comprised a comparatively small and well-to-do class in the Colony. The number of slaves named in the will and the property inventoried by his executrix indicate a busy plantation and substantial business interests. But the fact that he signed his will with his mark extremely feeble physical condition or complete illiteracy, the latter of which hardly seems likely.

His will was recorded in the Loudoun County records at Leesburg, Virginia:

(Loudoun County was part of a large tract of country granted by the King of England to Lord Fairfax, including all the land between the Rappahannock and Potomac rivers to their sources, and since called the "Northern Neck of Virginia". The first permanent settlement of this county began about 1730, when it was part of Prince William County. Prince William County, then owned

by Lord Thomas Fairfax, baron of Cameron, was divided in 1742, in Fairfax County being created and named in honor of the landlord. In 1757 Fairfax County was divided and Loudoun County created and named in honor of Lord Loudoun, a prominent officer in English army, afterward commander-in-chief of the British forces in the American colonies, and Governor of Virginia from 1758 to 1762.)

#### WILL OF ROGER WIGGINTON

(Records of Loudoun County, Virginia, Book B, page 223.)

In the Name of God Amen:

I, Roger Wigginton, Gentleman, of Loudoun County, being in perfect health (praised be God) do make this my last Will and Testament as followeth:

Imprimis. I give to my dear and loving Wife a Negro fellow named Charles and a Negro Woman named Befs, for term of life and after her Decease the said Charles to be (sold &) equally distributed among all my children.

Item. I (give) and bequeath to my Daughter, Mary Davis the above named Negro Befs after my wife's decease with all her increase from the present time.

Item. 2nd. I give and Bequeath to my son, Henry Wigginton, a Negro Girl named Hannah, one feather bed and furniture, one dark Bay Mare and one Cow and Calf.

Item. 3rd. I give and bequeath to my son, Benjamin Wigginton, one Negro Girl named Cloe, one Feather bed and Furniture, one Cow and Calf and the Colt that the old Mare is with Foal at present with, when he comes of Age.

Item. 4th. I give and bequeath to my son, William Wigginton, one Negro Boy named Tim, one Feather bed and Furniture, a Young Mare formerly called his and one Cow and Calf.

Item. 5th. I give and Bequeath to my Daughter, Elizabeth Wigginton, one Negro Girl named Diner and one Cow and Calf.

Item 6th. I give to my son, Roger Wigginton, one Negro Girl named Nan and Twenty pounds hard Cash and one Cow and Calf.

Item. 7th. I give and Bequeath to my Daughter Elenor Wigginton, one Negro Boy named Bristo and Twenty pounds hard Cash and a Cow and Calf.

If any of my children above mentioned should die without an Heir, it is my will that their Estates should be Sold and equally divided among all the residue of my children.

The rest and Residue of my Goods and Chattles and personal

Estate after payment of my Debts, Legacies & Funeral Expenses, I leave to my loving Wife during her life, and afterward to be Equally divided between my Daughters, Elizabeth and Eleanor and my Son, Roger.

I Constitute my loving Wife as Executrix with John Davis and my son, Henry Wigginton, my sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament.

In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this tenth day of March in the year of our Lord, 1778.

At a Court held for Loudoun County, June the Eighth, 1778, this will was proved by the oaths of John Jackson and John Bayles, witnesses thereto and ordered to be Recorded, and on motion of Eleanor Wigginton the Executrix and John Davis, one of the Executors, therein named, who making oath according to law, a Certificate is granted to them for obtaining a probate thereof in due form and giving Security. Whereupon the said Eleanor and John, with John Minor, Gentleman, and George Kilgore, their securities, entered into and acknowledged the Bond in the Penalty of Three Thousand Pounds, conditioned as the law directs.

Henry Wigginton was born in Loudoun County, Virginia. He later moved to Bourbon County, Kentucky where he lived the remainder of his life and is buried on his "old home place" (Owned



by W. L. Stewart, R.F.D. 2, Paris, Kentucky in 1929). He was a planter and miller; was a communicant of the Baptist Church and a member of the Democratic Party.

He was married in Montgomery County, Maryland by Rev. Joseph Theodreid to Anna Vallandigham (pronounced Valandam), daughter of Michael Van Landigham and Anne Dawson; granddaughter of Michael Van Landigham and Jane. Michael Van Landigham and Jane, his wife, were both natives of French Flanders new Courtiers. They came to America in 1690 and settled in Stafford County, Virginia. Later they moved to Northumberland County between the Rappahannock and Chesapeake Bay. Their son Michael moved to Fairfax County where he married Anna Dawson. It was about this time that the family name was changed from Van Landigham to Vallandigham. Michael and Anne had five children, three sons and two daughters. Anne Dawson was born in Fairfax County, Virginia and died and is buried in Bourbon County, Kentucky beside her husband.

(The following data taken from an application for a Revolutionary pension and now on file in the archives at Washington, and formerly accepted as applying to Henry Wigginton (IV-13) is now considered subject to some question and should be checked for positive identification):

"Henry Wigginton related in his declaration for a pension that he was born the year of Braddock's defeat, in Loudoun County, Virginia. He served in the revolutionary war under Captain Robert Fryer and Captain Sampson Trammel, in the battalions of Maj. Cox and Maj. Radican with the regiments of Col. Levin Powell, Col. Meriwether and Col. Matthews, under the command of General Stebbins. He served at Yorktown and was present at the surrender of Cornwallis although his enlistment expired October 13 and the British did not surrender until the 19th. He was named in his father's will to assist his mother in the administration of the estate, but was absent, presumably in the war, at the time the will was probated. His services as a Revolutionary soldier is referred to in 'Collins' History of Kentucky, page 6; in Perrin's History of Bourbon County, Kentucky, page 75; in Eckenrode's Virginia Revolutionary Soldiers, page 470, and his declaration for a pension is on file in the Bureau of Pensions, in the Archives Building at Washington, D. C."

He migrated to Bourbon County, Kentucky in 1788 and spent the remainder of his life there. He was sometimes known in the family as "Harry".

Fielding Wigginton was married in what is not Trimble County, Kentucky and all his children were born there. In 1830 he moved to Bourbon County, Kentucky to serve as overseer of the farm of his grandfather, Henry Wigginton (IV-13) but returned to Trimble County in 1832 and settled on a farm about a half mile west of a post office then known as Palmyra.

His sister-in-law, Angelina Curl, had moved from Kentucky to Missouri and was living on a farm near the present site of Chantilly in Lincoln County. She wrote to her brother, William S. Smith, telling him of the need of a teacher at the New Salem School nearby and William visited her and was appointed teacher of the school. The following summer he returned to Kentucky and suggested to Fielding that he sell his Kentucky land, which had greatly enhanced in value in the last few years, and go with him to Missouri where land could be entered from the Government for \$1.25 per acre.

In the spring of 1846, Fielding sold his farm and stock and equipment and most of his chattels and brought the rest, including a daybed still cherished by descendants, to Missouri. His brother-in-law, William S. Smith went to Cincinnati and engaged passage on a through steamer. While preparations were being concluded, Fielding and Teresa with the children spent several days with her mother, Sarah Dunlap Smith, at Milton, Kentucky. They boarded the steamboat at Milton on the Ohio River with their household goods Sunday night and landed at St. Louis the following Saturday morning. There William visited his aunt, Mrs. McCarten, (sister of his father Reuben Smith) whose daughter married George Knapp, associated with the St. Louis Republic from 1828 until his death at sea on his way back from Europe in 1833. The rest of the family "traded" in the St. Louis markets. The boat then continued up the Mississippi River and landed them at Cape au Gris near the present site of Winfield, Missouri.

Fielding rented a farm the first year in order to have an opportunity to become acquainted with local land value and instead of taking up new land as originally planned, bought the farm of Crawford McWair, a nephew of Alexander McWair, the first Governor of Missouri. The farm remained in the Wigginton Family until 1950, a period covering more than a hundred years. The house was a very rude structure, built of logs as was every other farm house of the day, consisting of two rooms with half a story above and was in poor repair. The farm was heavily timbered. Only a few acres had been cleared. The swamps in the lower land below the bluffs had not been drained. Vegetation was rank and swarms of mosquitoes spread malaria and made the house all but uninhabitable in summer. As screens had not yet come into use, the only protection was a smudge fire built at the open door to prevent their entrance. Everyone in the neighborhood was ill with malaria and the family bitterly regretted leaving Kentucky and more than once seriously considered abandoning their Missouri investments and returning to Kentucky.

Teresa Elizabeth Smith was the daughter of Reuben Smith who sometime prior to 1810 moved from Virginia to South Carolina where he married Sarah Dunlap, whose father had emigrated from Ireland to South Carolina a few years before. Shortly after his marriage Reuben moved to Kentucky where he spent the remainder of his life. His family bible carries the following record:

The Mother of Presidents Breaks Into the White House Again

"The announcement of President Wilson's approaching marriage to Mrs. Galt places me in a reminiscent mood and my memory is entertaining visitors, strange from an absence of fifty years.

Over half a century ago, I knew the father of the bride expectant, Judge William Holcomb Bolling, intimately. He was not much older than I, and lived only a few miles from my home. His father, Dr. Archibald Bolling, was a lineal descendant from Princess Pocahontas. He came to our neighborhood to take the practice of my father's uncle-in-law, Dr. Cabell, who had died, and that of my uncle, Dr. Frank Meriwether, who had removed to Albermarle county. He was married to Miss Anne, daughter of one of our neighbors, Mr. Benjamin Wigginton. To them were born three children, two girls and Wm. Holcombe. The latter was as handsome as an Apollo. He attended the Virginia University where his last year was my first and there we met again on terms of most friendly intimacy. He soon went to Wytheville, Virginia, to practice law, and our close and intimate association, lasting from early childhood to man's estate, came to an end.

Mr. Joseph Reese was another close neighbor of our family. I remember his son, John, and his three daughters, Mrs. White, Mrs. Julia Cheatwood and Mrs. Allen Hatcher - all beautiful women. Mrs. White had two children by Mr. White, Samuel and Sallie. After Mr. White's death, she was married to Mr. Logwood by whom she had two children, a son and a daughter.

Miss Sallie White, the mother of Mrs. Galt, was known beyond the limits of the neighborhood for her beauty and brilliancy of intellect. The neighbor boys were all crazy about her, but none dared aspire to win her, for word went around that she was engaged to N. L. Cheatwood, brother-in-law of her aunt, Julia Cheatwood.

Nick, as we called him for his namesake, Bishop Cobbs, went to Virginia University to pursue the study of medicine, his chosen profession. He was my room mate my third year at the university. We roomed part of that year in the Old Monroe house on Monroe Hill, then balance of the session one of the just finished houses of the "Dawson's Row".

At the university, the law students ranked highest, then the academics, and the medical students at the bottom with the soubriquet "Dirty Meds". Now although my room mate was a Dirty Med, yet I could not but look up to him as I would have done to the possessor of wealth of Golconda. Did he not possess the heart and promise of the lovely Miss Sallie White? They were infinitely more precious surely than all its diamonds.

Virgil has told us "Varium et mutabile Semper Femina"--woman is a fickle and ever changing thing--so alas! when we got home I looked upon Dr. Nick as a fast friend only. The halo I had built around him, had gone with the lovely Sallie White, who chose the handsome descendant of Pocahontas, Wm. H. Bolling, the lawyer, rather than wait to fulfill her promise to the young physician.

A closer friend I have never had than Dr. Nicholas L. Cheatwood. We met very often at parties during and after the war, and I never heard one word of complaint of woman's fickleness. In due time he was married and was the happy father of several children at the time of his death. He was a noble man and a valued friend--peace to his memory." F. T. M.
